





A. Parental Income Distribution at Selected Colleges





B. Parental Income Distribution at Ivv-Plus Colleges



New Mexico is the only state with an official State Question: "Red or Green?"






thing five:

"Ope!" = shorthand apology


OPE! exclamation

The Stonewall riots

During the 1960's, homosexuality was illegal in every US state except Illinois. But LGBT people often went to secret gay bars and clubs, especially in New York. These clubs were frequently owned by the Mafia, who paid police officers to turn a blind eye to what was going on behind closed doors. LGBT people needed a place where they could be safe and free without fearing the outside world.



It is widely believed that drag queen Marsha F Johnson was one of the first people to resist arrest, among others such as Stormé DeLarverie and Sylvia Rivera. Following their lead, riots guick
